From the Pastor's Desk



Greetings to you and peace from God our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ.

How are you holding up in light of the furor around Covid19? It has been interesting to encounter the panic to get supplies and all the press intensely asking about the availability of tests to check for Covid19. I don't mean to make light of this situation because certainly there is a lot to be concerned about for elderly people who have underlying health issues and for anyone whose immunity is compromised. Otherwise, the majority of people will be fine.... IF we follow the suggestion to WASH HANDS for 20 seconds and, allow SPACE whenever we are around people. Of course, what we have heard about people fighting over toilet paper, etc., people are not keeping 6 feet apart. But, I cannot emphasize enough that we all need to keep calm and use common sense throughout this time. We do know that this too shall pass! We may face some difficult times over the next weeks and months, but we will get through this!!! One thing I will ask is that you join me in thinking about the people who have a difficult time getting around! I heard something on the news that an elderly couple was sitting in their car in a store parking lot for some time. They finally put the window down and asked a woman if she would be willing to get their groceries for them and they gave her the money to do this. Let's not make our elderly friends and neighbors do this. Let us show the love of Christ and initiate contact to offer our time and energy to helping others. We have seen enough of the self-centeredness flare because of the desire to hoard hand sanitizer, toilet paper, soup, canned goods, non-perishable items, etc. Let us try to be the community people that God desires us to be!

And, since it is spring (as of March 19th, near midnight), there will be outside chores that should or could be done. With our students being out of school, it would be a good time to teach them to care about others. With so much time on their hands, let's lead them in reaching out to do good for others. We could offer to clean up flower beds.

St. John's Blymire's U.C.C. Shirt Fund Raiser

We have not had a shirt Fund raiser project for a number of years. We had an offer of support for this project that will ensure a good profit for our church funds. The emblem is embroidered on the shirts, not screen printed.

Orders are due back to us by April 30.

We will offer White (as in the picture) and Light Blue colors in all sizes listed.

The sizes we offer are: Men's: S, M, L, XL, 2XL, 3XL, 4XL.

Tall Men's: ST, MT, LT, XLT, 2XLT, 3XLT, 4XLT.

Ladies: AS, AM, AL, AXL, A2XL, A3XL, A4XL.

Youth sizes: YS, YM, YL, YXL.

PRICES: \$25.00 per shirt for S, M, L, or XL. sizes (Two for \$45.00) (Three for \$65.00) (Four for \$80.00) and can be in a combination of colors and sizes. There is a surcharge per shirt for the larger sizes! For a 2XL SHIRT, you would add \$2.00 per shirt; 3XL you would add \$4.00 per shirt; and for 4XL you would add \$5.00 per shirt.

Note: If you order three shirts.... One Men's 3XL, one ladies AXL and one Youth L, the price would be \$65.00 + \$4.00 for the surcharge on the Men's shirt. If you order Two Tall Men's 2XLT and one Ladies' L, the cost would be \$65.00 + \$8.00 for the surcharge on 2 of the Tall Men's size.

My friend and I were at a local wholesale nursery when I noticed a bird a few steps behind her. I called her attention to it and the next thing we knew, this bird started squawking, then limping in a circle. We thought it was bizarre, so we did some investigating and soon found a nest full of eggs nearby. I was worried something might be legitimately wrong with the mama bird, but a little Google searching explained what was really happening. This type of plover fakes a broken wing and squawks to draw attention away from the nest. Predators (as she incorrectly identified us) are then sidetracked by the display, thinking the mother bird is easy prey. The image brought an entirely new dimension to what it means to take refuge under the Father’s wings. Because not only does God protect us from danger, but he loves us so fiercely he puts himself in our place directly in line of the predator, as Jesus does in the most ultimate way. What a beautiful depiction of a parent’s love, and the safety we have, even as vulnerable hatchlings, under His wings.


Finally the teacher said,



Mire and the children and I will have to sneak out there early because we would like to hear the service, but don't want to get run over by the cars. 

Scripture AND NATURE

Conduct a simple experiment to illustrate Easter's meaning.



What you need:

- White carnations
- Scissors
- Vase
- Water
- Red food coloring
- Bible

What you do:

1. Cut the carnation stems (at an angle) to about 8 inches long.
2. Fill the vase halfway with water. Add 10 drops of food coloring. (More may be needed to darken the water.)
3. Add the cut flowers and observe what happens to the petals over time.
4. Discuss how this is like Jesus' work on the cross. Read 1 Peter 2:22-24 (NIV) and reflect on what his death means for us.
5. To learn more about this experiment, research capillary action.
