# From the Pastor's Keyboard



Devotional writer Isabella Campolattaro recently wrote a devotional that focuses on the adage "Let go and let God", which is so easy to say, but so difficult to do. Or am I the only one who has a hard time giving all of my life over to Jesus and not trying to control events in my life? I'd like to share Isabella Campolattaro's words in hope that they will be as helpful to you as they were to me that Jesus is all-sufficient for our lives:

Unless the LORD builds the house, the builders labor in vain. Unless the LORD watches over the city, the guards stand watch in vain. Psalm 127:1 (NLV)

In some respects, I've lived like an atheist for much of my Christian life. Wait! Before you wonder if I'm a spiritual impostor, hear me out. You see, despite my love for Jesus, I acted as though everything that happened—or didn't happen in my life—depended on me. What's worse, despite all my Bible reading, prayer, and praises, I thought I could somehow manipulate the events in my life by my own effort. That's not grace. That's not faith. That's the world's way. My way.

The Bible tells me plainly that apart from Jesus, I can do nothing (John 15:5). Yet, I had this idea that I had to make all the best decisions to ensure the right outcomes, as though I could even determine what the right outcome was in the first place. If what happened was not what I wanted or expected, I'd assume I'd failed or sinned, and it was all my fault.

After making the mistake of leaving Jesus out of certain parts of my life, I've come to the conclusion that I now embrace and believe wholeheartedly. Jesus really is entirely sufficient (2 Corinthians 12:9). He pours out His grace in the everyday way I so desperately need, especially on those days when I think I can do it myself and try to live like an atheist.

FAITH STEP: Look up the definition of an atheist in the dictionary. Consider whether you are counting on your wisdom, effort, or good judgment in dealing with a particular issue or if you are depending on Jesus.

I pray that you and I take Isabella Campolattaro's words to heart as we go through the month of May when we celebrate Mother's Day and Pentecost Sunday, which commemorates that birth of the church when the first followers of Jesus were filled with the Holy Spirit which led them to realize that being part of our Christian faith community is ultimately important because one's commitment and passion for our Lord starts to fade when one separates from the community of faith and tries to "go it alone" as a Christian.

As I mentioned last month, I pray that we celebrate and support the new ministries we have started here at Blymire's Church, such as Messy Church and livestreaming and the revitalized ministries we have here, such as the Circle of Grace, FUN Team, Bible Study, vocal and bell choirs. I also ask that we all celebrate and support our interim tasks that will help us to soon start filling out our church profile – tallying our Diversity Survey, determining what we need to change or tweak about our church's Constitution and By-Laws, establishing active and affiliated church membership lists, looking for a new home for Emmanuel's Closet, and continuing our caring responses to local and wider church needs, and starting a Profile Committee.

I also ask that you prayerfully remember the questions that we have been asking all during our interim period together: Who are we as St. John's Blymire's United Church of Christ? Who are our neighbors? Who is God calling us to become as we journey into God's future? What is our unique niche here in Dallastown?

### **Check Your Important Documents**

Recently I was setting up a life insurance policy for online auto pay. The Term policy was purchased about 20 years ago as a backup to my main policy. A beneficiary was not listed on the policy. I knew a beneficiary was listed on my original paper copy. Somehow it did not get copied over to the documents the company listed online. In the Beneficiary Tab it stated, "Only policy holder may name a beneficiary or contingent beneficiary". I made the necessary changes to the beneficiaries and received confirmation through an e-mail.

I have begun to check my other important documents to make sure that information that is listed online is correct with any paper copies that we have. It is not known what difficulties this may have caused if the policy had been claimed. Many times, the person on the phone is looking at a computer screen with your information on it. They do not have ready access to any past paper copies that were made. Protect yourself, check your important documents and clarify any misunderstandings that may exist.

Don't rely on your loved ones to make those corrections after the fact.

We often see sandhill cranes in the fields around our house, but I had never seen one this young. I was surprised to read that many sandhill cranes

have only one baby to raise. They keep that child with them for a year, then the youngster transfers to a group of other young cranes who are learning together how to live on their own.

I teared up as I realized the connection of these three birds to my own life at the moment. In a week, we would be taking our only child to grad school in another state. He is paying his own rent for an apartment. He knows how to make bacon carbonara but often eats ramen noodles. He needs a credit card. He wants to buy a queen-size bed. Our young one is officially leaving the nest to live with his peers.

When our babies are young, we lean in close. We hold hands and wash faces. We laugh at their corny jokes and wonder at all the rocks in their pockets. There never seems to be enough time. Watching a child become his or her own person is the most exhilarating thing we will ever do.

When I read again how our Lord carries me as a father carries his child, I am overwhelmed by His great love. It gives me confidence to lay my head on His shoulder, maybe even cry a few tears, and sigh as His loving arms surround me until He finally carries me home.

## **Revelations for May from "Bly Mire" Mouse**



To our dear church family:

What a busy month you all have had in April! Besides the usual weekday and Sunday activities, you've had some special events, such as your Maundy Thursday service, Easter service with lots of people, the baptism of Callie Nugent with even more people, and the first Messy Church session! And we saw and heard the excitement of the women (and two men) as you left for the women's retreat at Rehoboth Beach. You served food at several of these

events, which we and the young ones always like because the crumbs you leave are so tasty!

The friendly banter and conversation, the music, the messages, the lessons, and the everyday activities around here that we have seen and overheard do our hearts good – especially the fact that because Jesus rose from the dead, He lives in us and His presence is real (yes, even with us mice!). What better truth is there than that to shout from the rooftops (or to shout from the tops of the counters and tables for us mice)?

Speaking of shouting from the rooftops, we heard someone at church recently quote from Ephesians 5:19: "Speak to one another with psalms, hymns and spiritual songs. Sing and make music in your heart to the Lord, always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Did you know that some insect friends of ours make music in unusual ways? They are the cricket and the grasshopper. A grasshopper has long hind legs with a row of tiny pegs on the upper, inner portion of each leg. When these pegs are rubbed against the hard edge of one of the grasshopper's wings, a musical sound is produced. Some grasshoppers rub their hind legs together to make music. A cricket has ridges and also a sharp-edged area on its wings. When the wings are rubbed together, the cricket is said to be "singing."

Only male crickets and grasshoppers sing, and they do so to mate. The music may sound like a chirp, crackle, click, or creak. It may be soft or loud. The grasshopper tends to sing during the heat of a summer day and the cricket in the evening when it is cooler. If you run your fingers over the teeth of one of your combs, you can begin to understand how insect music is produced.

Another unusual thing about a cricket is that its ears are on its front legs. A grasshopper has ears on its abdomen. We could say that these insects make music and hear music in an extraordinary way! You could say that they are doing in wonderful ways what Ephesians 5:19 asks us to do!

As we've already mentioned when we talked about Easter, we remember that God has given us many wonderful things. Your human world – and our mouse world – is full of beauty and the miracles of God's creation. God's greatest gift to us is His constant love. This love was demonstrated for us in the life of Jesus Christ.

We know from you all that one way we can thank God and share our Christian joy with others is through music. Like the legs and wings of the grasshopper and cricket, our voices are musical instruments and can be used to worship God. We hear your beautiful music all the time – with the outstanding organ music, the hymns, the choir anthem, and the ringing bells. We two and the little ones even try to join along with you from time to time in your music and praises to God! You are encouraging us to use our voices and our ears to appreciate music and to give thanks to God. (1)

Just one more thing. We know that Mother's Day is coming up. We want to share with you all what we saw one of you do with each letter of the word MOTHER that tells us why mothers are so fantastic.

M is the first letter of map. A map reminds us that mothers spend a lot of time taking us to places, such as school, church, a friend's house.

**O** is the first letter of orange. An orange reminds us that mothers fix the food we eat and make sure that we eat the right kinds of food each day.

T is the first letter of thermometer. A thermometer reminds us that mothers take care of us when we are sick and help us get well.

**H** is the first letter of house. This reminds us that mothers (with the help of the rest of us) keep our houses (in our case, our mouse holes) clean and nice.

E is the first letter of ear. Ears remind us that whenever we call, mothers hear us and help us.

**R** is the first letter of rib. A rib is a bone near our heart and near to our side. When God wanted to tell us how Eve, the first mother was made, God said that He took a rib from her husband, Adam, and created the first mother. (2)

Aren't you glad that God made mothers? We thank God for all mothers (human and mouse) who love us and care for us in so many ways.

- Cup
- Scissors
- Pencil and markers
- Plastic drinking straw
- Glue



- 1. Using the cup's circular shape, trace two identical circles on the paper.

- 2. In pencil, draw a person's head on one circle. Then place the blank circle on top and use the image beneath to guide you in drawing a flame above the head.
- 3. Color the two images with markers.
- 4. Apply glue to the backs of the circles and sandwich the top of the straw between them so it looks like a lollipop. Let dry.
