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From the Pastor's Keyboard



What is God calling us here at St. John's Blymire's United Church of Christ of Dallastown, Pennsylvania, uniquely, to be and to do? What is our God-given niche in our community? What is it that only we can do (and no one else can do) for God's glory and purposes?

In the biblical book of Esther, Queen Esther (which some of you saw the production by that name at Sight and Sound) was told by her Uncle Mordecai that she was placed in her situation to make requests to King Xerxes on behalf of the Jewish people "for such a time as this."

Can it be said that we here today have been placed at St. John's Blymire's UCC "for such a time as this"? Our Profile Committee is asking exactly that question as we start filling out our church profile, which is the preliminary step to obtaining a new settled pastor or new pastoral opportunity.

It does us no good to yearn for the "good old past" of filled churches and many children. The past is exactly that – past – gone. It does no good to compare ourselves with other churches and think that if they can do things a certain way and appear to be successful, then we should act exactly that way, too. No; God has a unique mission for each church. We are not meant to be clones of each other. And it does no good complaining about what people do or don't do nowadays regarding the church. There have been so many cultural shifts in our country over the last few years that we are left only to say, "It is what it is." If we follow the example of Jesus (which I think is always a good way to go), we imitate Him who went out to people (many of whom were looked down upon by the respectable people of that day) and met them where they were at. He met their needs with His offer of salvation, freedom from all that was keeping them from God, healing, and eternal hope.

Where are people at today? Many are just keeping afloat amidst the stresses of jobs, careers, activities, and family life. Many are desperately searching for spiritual meaning and purpose, but are not finding it in organized religion. They often find such meaning and purpose in affinity groups or leisure activities and thus have become agnostic or atheist.

How are we to meet those people where they are at today? One way is to "think outside the box" and outside our four walls to "rub elbows" and to let people see our faith in action with such activities as our FUN events, our chicken barbecues, our outdoor concerts, our Messy Church, and our participation in local carnivals and parades (Can we revive that kind of involvement?). Yes, we need to look inward at times and to support and encourage each other with our own worship services, Bible study, prayers for each other, Circle of Grace,

and men's group – so that we remain strong in our walk with Jesus. But we do those things in order to reach out to meet people's needs – to meet them where they are at today – in Jesus' name and with His grace and love and welcome.

Our Bible Study group has been going through the Book of Matthew the last few months. Among other things, Matthew was addressing people who were new in their Christian walk. They didn't know exactly who should be included in their group, how they should structure themselves, and what it meant to be people of "The Way." But Matthew was totally convinced that the Body of Christ, the church, is absolutely essential for our full expression of our Christian faith. Later, Luke, gospel writer and author of the book of Acts, and the Apostle Paul, confirm the absolute necessity for the Body of Christ, the church, so we can nurture our own faith, support and encourage each other in our lives of faith, share what we have with other believers, and disciple others (help them to see how they can activate God's touch on their lives). For what can be more important – for now and eternity – than nurturing our own, and helping others nurture, a close relationship with Jesus Christ?

Please offer any input you can to our Profile Committee (Cindy Axe, Ed Bishop, Peggie Free, and Marti Leader) as we all continue to ask: Who are we as a church now? What is God calling us to be in the next 5 years? Our calling will be different than it was 20 or 30 years ago. It's tempting to want to go back to the way things were that we are comfortable with. But we don't have that luxury. And besides, isn't it exciting to follow where the Holy Spirit is leading us today in new ways – as the Holy Spirit has always led God's people through the centuries?

I believe that God has placed us exactly here "for such a time as this"! See you around this summer. God bless, Pastor Rick



What Is the Essential Work of Congregations? By Rev. Cameron Trimble

Our friend Cameron Trimble, convenor of Convergence, recently wrote about insights that she received from her grandfather, Rev. Dr. James McCormick, a retired minister in the United Methodist Church:

Over time I realized that while he had many wise observations to offer, two came up over and over again. In teaching me to see and sense that "still small voice," he would say, "If it looks, acts, talks, and walks like Jesus, then it's of God." For him, Jesus was the clearest example we have of God-incarnate. That said, he didn't mean this in an exclusive way. He would also say that throughout history, we have seen people who so beautifully embody the spirit of Love that we sense in our own selves the presence of God within them. Being in their presence inspires us to embody those same qualities – loving kindness, deep compassion, and true empathy.

The second lesson that my grandfather would repeat was this: "The quality of your life depends upon the quality of your relationships." When we fill our lives with kind, generous, loving people, then we develop kindness, generosity, and love within ourselves. If we surround ourselves with angry, manipulative, untrustworthy people, then we also risk taking on those characteristics.

I think about his wisdom often when I consult with churches. Properly understood, congregations at their best are places where we can be with others who make us more compassionate, generous, peace-filled, and kind. They are also places where we practice fairness, justice, and being beloved community. Over time, if we are deepening in Spirit, we begin to look, act, walk, and talk more like Jesus. By this, I mean we are coming to understand essential perennial wisdom rooted in a sense of Oneness with all that exists.

What if we have made all of this congregational business too complicated? In congregations where I have served as pastor, we create a discernment compass that helped us make decisions that balanced our being with our doing.

We ask a certain level of discernment questions. These are designed to remind us that how we spend our days is how we spend our lives. Christian tradition teaches that balanced days include time for meditation, study, rest, work, and community/play. Each opportunity we said "yes" to had to nurture at least three of these practices. In that spirit, we would ask:

- 1. Does this opportunity strengthen our sense of community and connection?
- 2. Does this opportunity invite us into a space of prayer and meditation?
- 3. Does this opportunity deepen our study and learning?
- 4. Does this opportunity allow for rest and rejuvenation at needed intervals?
- 5. Does this opportunity further the work of justice and compassion in our community?

Then, we would move to the following discernment questions. Recognizing that everything we do should be in service to our spiritual maturation, we asked:

- 1. Will this experience make us more loving?
- 2. Will this experience gift us with new ways of knowing and understanding God and ourselves?
- 3. Will this experience develop within us a greater sense of peace?
- 4. Will this experience grant us wisdom for the benefit of the world?
- 5. Will this experience deepen our sense of gratitude for God, Creation and one another?
- 6. Will this experience strengthen our resilience for the life of faith and the work of justice?
- 7. Will this experience fill us with a sense of joy and aliveness?

I leave this now to your discernment if this helps you make decisions about how you invest your time together. In the end, our only "yes" should be in service to love for God, your neighbors, and yourself.



THE WAGGLE DANCE

My honeybees work at a frantic pace in warmer months, packing away provisions for winter. The bees store far more honey than they need, and I have come to take some for myself.

The meadow where I keep my hives is a shimmering sea of goldenrod, with islands of asters. Bull thistle thrusts itself up here and there, their huge flowers like purple cupcakes, I give the first hive a few puffs of smoke from the smoker and pry open the aluminum lid. The top compartment is full of amber honey, forty pounds by the heft of it.

A honeybee's wings stroke approximately 11,000 time per minute (180 strokes per second) to create that distinctive, gentle onomatopoeic buzz. When bees get alarmed and angry, their wings beat faster and the buzz gets louder, sharper, But today the buzz is soft and light. I work carefully, slowly and the bees continue to go about their business, while I go about mine.

When I inspect the second hive, something catches my eye, and I watch spellbound. One bee, her body dusted with orange pollen, is doing a little dance. Her abdomen vibrating, she wiggles and shimmies and walks this way and that. Apiarists call it the Waggle Dance, and I've seen it just twice in forty years of keeping bees. The dance is a kind of code. The bee is telling the rest where a rich food source is located. Her instructions communicate the distance to the food source and its location in reference to the hive and the sun. Amazing!

It is 88 degrees outside today, 103 inside my canvas suit and I am dripping with sweat. But the work is worth it. I've seen something remarkable and tomorrow morning my English muffin will be drenched in fresh, golden honey.

Life is good!

Thank you Lord for this sweet life. Give me eyes to see the sheer beauty, the magnificence, of creation. Give me a heart of gratitude so filled with thanksgiving that complaint and concern will have no room to dwell. Amen.



A sprinkle of pepper and a dab of soap illustrate a big concept from God's Word.






- Shallow dish
