From the Pastor's Keyboard



Dear friends in this wonderful family of faith,

As we enter the month of May (Have April showers brought the promised May flowers?), I share with you words from devotional writer Denise M. Greene, starting with Hosea 10:12: **Sow for yourselves righteousness; reap steadfast love; break up your fallow ground, for it is time to seek the LORD, that He may come and rain righteousness upon you.**

Ms. Greene writes: "When I was in the fifth grade, along with making regular assignments, my teacher planted 'life seeds'. She taught us to play the game of chess. My classmates and I took turns baking brownies under her supervision. My teacher even taught us to square dance. Near Christmas, she assigned the memorization of Luke 2:1-20.

"Now I wonder what lessons I am teaching the next generation. *Am I planting good seeds? If I watch questionable television programs, what am I teaching? What am I teaching with the language I use? Do I show them that attending church is a priority, and that I put God first in my life?*

"In Hosea 10:12, we find that the prophet employed the familiar agrarian metaphor of sowing seed to get Israel's attention. How might we sow righteousness (both as individual Christians and as a Christian church)? By:

- . Preparing a meal for someone in need, we can demonstrate how to be God's hands.
- . Visiting the sick, we can be God's feet.
- . Listening to someone, we can be God's ears.
- . Praying aloud, we demonstrate the importance of talking with God.
- . Acting out Bible stories, we can bring them to life.

"Evaluate your life and sense what type of seeds you are planting for the next generation."

May we all take Ms. Green's words to heart this month of May and ask God to help us evaluate our individual lives and our congregational life and make sure that we are planting the right type of seeds for future generations. Let us pray and resolve that we will put God first in our daily walks!

I share another biblical verse with you as we begin the month of May. That verse is Psalm 55:22: **Cast your burden on the LORD, and He will sustain you; He will never permit the righteous to be moved.**

As your interim pastor, I have the honor and privilege (as does our Lay Minister Cindy Innerst-Axe) of walking beside each of you in your spiritual journeys and in the spiritual journey we are on as a congregation.



As we walk together, one of the things that strikes me, in the words of Oswald Chambers, is that we need to recognize the difference between burdens that are right for us to bear and burdens that are wrong. Because of what Jesus has done for us, there are some burdens that we should never bear. But there are some burdens placed on us by God which God does not intend to lift off. God wants us to roll them back on Him – to literally “cast our burdens”, which God has given us, “on the Lord...”

Chambers reminds us that if we serve God and do God’s work but get out of touch with God, the sense of responsibility we feel will be overwhelming and defeating. But if we will only roll back onto God the burden God has placed on us, God will take away that immense feeling of responsibility, replacing it with an awareness and understanding of Himself and His presence.

In my ministry over the years, I have asked many times how many of us set out to serve God with great courage and with the right motives. But with no intimate fellowship with Jesus Christ, how many of us are soon defeated? How often do we not know what to do with our burden, and our burden produces weariness in our lives? How often do others say of us, or we say of ourselves, “What a sad end to something that had such a great beginning?”

“Cast your burden on the Lord....” Chambers reminds us that often we have been bearing it all. But instead, we need to deliberately place one end on God’s shoulder. “...the government will be upon His shoulder.” (Isaiah 9:6)

So let’s commit to God whatever burden God has placed on each of us. Let’s not cast it aside, but put it over onto God and place ourselves there with it. We will then see that our burden is lightened by the sense of companionship. But we should never try to separate ourselves from our burden.

That’s why Jesus said: **“For My yoke is easy, and My burden is light.”** (Matthew 11:30). As Chambers concludes, the only way to know the strength of God is to take the yoke of Jesus upon us and learn from Him.

Let Cindy or I know if you would like help in discerning how to shoulder with God the burden God has placed upon you.

And let Cindy and I help us all continue to discern the answer to the questions we have been looking at the last few months: **Who are we as St. John’s Blymire’s United Church of Christ? Who are our neighbors? Who is God calling us to become as we journey into God’s future? What is our unique niche here in Dallastown?**

My grandchildren live several states away, but I think of them every day.



a fun Flower Frog

A flower frog sits atop a vase to help arrange flowers and hold stems in place. This personalized frog will become a favorite!

What you need:

- Air-dry clay
- Roller
- Vase (or jar)
- Plastic knife
- Straw
- Acrylic paint and brushes



What you do:

1. Roll out a portion of clay to about 1/2-inch thickness.
2. Cut out a circle that's slightly larger than the vase opening. (This will allow the finished frog to sit securely on top.)
3. To make holes for stems, use a straw to punch out circle shapes. If you make more than one frog, try arranging the holes in different patterns.
4. Let dry completely. Then personalize your work with acrylic paint.
5. When dry, place the frog atop the vase. Arrange flowers and greenery to make a Mother's Day bouquet.
