From the Pastor's Desk



Greetings to you and peace from God our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ.

So far this summer I have been enjoying a few things.... Knitting prayer shawls and lap blankets for the ministry we have at Blymire's and reading a series of books by Philip Gulley. The books are the Harmony series and they focus on a Quaker minister who after serving a church in a neighboring state has come back to his hometown (Harmony) to serve in the Harmony Friends Meeting. It is quite hilarious to read about some of the church members and their "devotion" to serving God. And most chapters in all of the books I have read so far seem to end with a paragraph that has a life-message for the reader. I will admit, I have offered quite a number of laughs and giggles because I can certainly identify with some of the antics of the members of the Friends Meeting. I will also say though, I have never encountered a parishioner whose calling in life was a ministry focused on Scripture Eggs or Scripture Balloons, but nonetheless, the sincerity of this man to feel God was calling him to minister in these ways is thought provoking.

In the fourth book in the series, which I just finished reading last night, there is a chapter where Sam (the pastor) works on his house and succeeds in painting the first floor on his own. But in trying to paint the second story, he hires a town "handyman" who ends up painting that part of the house a slightly different color. Sam and his wife Barbara know the color is different, but the handyman points out that with all the trees in front of their house, no one else would be able to see the different colors and that only they would see the "blemish." The chapter ends with the message that, we are all well aware of the "blemishes" of our homes, but we love them just the same.

I got to thinking "How beautiful life would be if we would apply this to the people around us? We are generally fully aware (for better or worse) of the blemishes of those around us. Now, hopefully none of us spend any effort in pointing out other people's blemishes (like a few of the Friends Meeting parishioners are prone to do). Instead, we should make sure we love them just the same. And, instead of being quick on the draw to point the finger at others (like a few of the Friends Meeting parishioners are prone to do), we should first look at our own lives and our own ministry and see if we recognize our own blemishes. We all have them, you know. And we should try to work on

our Lord that we can be. We should put as much effort into being the best for God as we tend to put effort into our own interests. But even as I think about trying to change my life and remove the many imperfections that I know are there, I hear God saying to me..... "I love you just the way you are! Imperfections and all! WHAT???? Wait a minute! How earth-shattering is that thought? We affirm that God loves us just the way we are, right? Then, how about we make a focused effort to try to apply that to how we view the world around us? That, even though we may be quick to see and identify blemishes in the people around us, how about we love them just the way they are instead of trying to mold them into the idea we have about how they or the world should be.

The world is a beautiful place and there are many beautiful people in it! We never were created to be just like everyone else. If that were the case, God would only have one mold for a human being and we would all be clones! So, instead of trying to make others be just like us, let us give praise to God for our differences. If we would, the world would be a _____ far better place!



Our church will be setting up a booth to hand out flyers about the church and have sand art projects for children at the Dallastown Carnival, which will run from August 14 thru August 18.



WONDERFUL

We seek and we seek and we seek, and we search and search, usually not thinking at all that the very thing we search for-be it peace or riches or hope or love-is within us the whole time. Anything we could ever want is a part of us already. Do I want to be rich? Then I need to realize the riches inside of me and appreciate them. Do I want to know secrets of the ancients? Then I need to look at the answers that come from inside of me and heed them and live by them.

There are many wonders of the world, but even the ability to appreciate those wonders comes from inside of ourselves. One person can stop and stare in awe at a beautiful rainbow, while another keeps on walking without paying the least attention to the wonder of the sight. The first person is in touch with that part of him or herself that allows them to feel wonder, while the second is unable or unwilling to recognize the amazing qualities of the sight. I think that it's time for us to stop looking only outside of ourselves for answers and wonders. There are wonders out there, of course, and we should enjoy them, but it's also important to get in touch with ourselves—who we are and what we are—if we're to be in touch with the marvelous nature of life and living.

We can see, we can feel, we can love, we can laugh, we can interpret, we can appreciate,

If there was ever a goal of the spiritual life, it would be this. For God to help us see things as they really are, not as our anxieties, our fears, our incessant busyness urges us to see, but as we can be perceived from a heavenly perspective. For us to see how truly big the world is, vast and luminous, not narrow and scary, and for us to

BABY, YOU'RE A FIREWORK: 3 WAYS YOU'RE DESIGNED



People are funny; they want the front of the bus, middle of the road, and back of the church.

In another life, I produced a fireworks show called "SkyConcert" that was choreographed precisely to music and broadcast live on TV and radio. In 25 years of doing that event we were never rained out. I asked the Lord once why this fireworks show was so important that he always held back the rain. He pointed out a banner hanging outside a local church, festooned with fireworks bursts and the word "Joy" in the middle.

Joy. Fireworks are designed for joy. They are constructed with specific elements that radiate certain colors and patterns; barium chloride for green, copper compounds for blue, lithium carbonate for red, aluminum and magnesium for whites and silvers. The designers know exactly the effect they are looking for when they put the fireworks together. And their work is a gift of joy to our eyes.

Pop songs have made the analogy that we are like fireworks. It's corny, but true. We were designed with specific elements; a measure of wit or sensitivity, a helping of talent or skill or curiosity, a sprinkling of unique insight or perspective. When the Designer planed us, he knew exactly the effect he was looking for. Believe it or not, like a firework, you are designed to be a joyous gift to the world. You are designed to shine.

Sometimes we assign the designation of shining to the likes of pop stars, poets, preachers and prophets. When the Holy Spirit came upon Zechariah at his son John the Baptist's birth. Sounds about right for a prophet. But for me? Yep, you were designed to shine. We are designed specifically by God for a purpose, here in this time and place. Just like a specific firework fits into and enhances a fireworks show. You were designed to shine the light of God through who you are and what you do.

Of course, God is always the source of light. He created us in his image and breathed life into us. Any light we have is a result of his creation and endowment. But he did put individual, unique light in each of us. It is illuminated by the presence of his spirit living in us. We share light in at least three ways:

We Emit- We carry it in us and into the circumstances and situations we encounter. That light shines at work, at the grocery store, at school, just by walking into those places. The light of Jesus living inside us shines through us, and the light of who God made us to be goes with us. Where you go-- where God launches you like a firework-- the light shines. You don't have to do anything to cause that. I want to keep that in mind and watch for what God might do because of that.

We Reflect- We convey the light—the light of truth in love. We speak out God's light found in the Bible, we pray God's light in situations.

We Amplify- We have the opportunity to

recognize the light in people and call




Summer is the perfect time to gaze at the wonders in the sky. Make this craft as a reminder of God's handlwork — including you!

What you need:

- Glass jar
- · Permanent marker
- · Glue (and water)
- Paper plate
- Paintbrush
- · Star sequins
- Battery-operated tea light

What you do:

- Around the jar's opening, write in permanent marker: Shine ... like stars in the sky. Philippians 2:15
- Pour some glue on the plate. Thin with some water.
- "Paint" the outside of the jar with glue and then sprinkle on some sequins. Let dry.
