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From the Pastor's Desk



Greetings to you and peace from God our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ.

As many of you know, on December 31st I went through surgery on my neck. I had pins and rods placed between discs 3, 4, and 5. I found out that the surgeon could not put the screws in the right side of disc 3 because the deterioration was too bad, But I am definitely feeling improvement over where I was before the surgery. I still have numbness in three fingers on both hands and when I do too much through the day, I also have the bad pain in the upper right arm. But, like I said, things are better than they were before! And the surgeon (and many of you too) have said...."Give it time." The surgeon even said to give it up to six months. (SIGH)

I was in the Well Span Surgical Center overnight so I came home New Year's Day. Now, a lot of people make New Year's resolutions that tend to help things "look up" in the new year. I will say, tongue in cheek, that my new year is definitely "looking up!" I have spent a lot of time in the recliner and when the neck gets too tired holding the head up, I go and lay down on the bed. So, both positions require that I look up to see the television or to talk to Jeri and Tigger.

That is the idea that I feel led to focus on for this message - that we should always "look up" - in other words, look up to God no matter what situation we may be experiencing in life. As many of you are also aware, there are quite a number of our faith family going through different things in their life. Some are recovering from an accident; some have gone through surgery for cancer and are now receiving additional treatment such as chemo or radiation; some have had problems with kidney stones; some have been through the loss of a loved one. Each one going through these things is at a different place. And, of course, we find out that one day can be a fairly good day, but the next day can be very trying. The thing I know I have come to rely on is that, no matter how hard or difficult the day may become because of pain (or whatever), I need to try to keep my mind and my heart focused on God - to keep "LOOKING UP!" So, I lovingly share that thought with all of you no matter what you may be facing in life. It is easier to keep looking up in the good times and on the good days, but may we all try our best to keep looking up on those difficult days! No matter how bad things may get, the strength of God is ALWAYS there for us and God will carry us through!

I will share with all of you also that I had been hoping to be knitting up a storm by this point in time (three weeks after surgery), but because of the arm pain I have not been knitting for hours at a time like I thought I might be. I have found out though that I can knit while laying on my right side on the bed, which is a total surprise to me!

I know too that when members of our faith family have gone through traumatic situations they express their sincere thankfulness for the love and support they receive from the people of Blymire's. I DEFINITELY underscore that! I will say "THANK YOU" to Jeri for his care.... he did help a lot when I could not do for myself. THANK YOU to Pastor Curt for doing the visits for January and THANK YOU to Jeri for leading worship January 6th and to Nelson for leading worship January 13th and 20th! I also am so touched by the many cards I received. I definitely have felt the power of all the prayers offered each day! And I thank all who traveled to the "Netherlands" of Stoverstown for a visit! A very sincere THANK YOU is extended to Joel and Steph Frey, Sandy Innerst, Beth Markey, Nelson Leader, Janie Montgomery, Ginny Weber and Marlene Matthews for the meals and a THANK YOU to the choir for the gift basket from Brown's with fruit and Gluten Free goodies. Thank you also for the gifts given by dear friends - the magnet bookmarks, the cookies and candy, the Angel and the FUDGE!!!! (If I missed mentioning anything, I do apologize because my mind does miss quite a few details at my age. LOL) I truly am touched by all the LOVE from my amazing faith family at Blymire's!!!!! I do plan to get back in to office hours beginning the last week of January and I trust that each day I will be able to spend more time doing what I need to do for the church. At this point I am restricted from driving, but I hope I will soon be able to drive again. I do appreciate all the offers of drivers I have received. I will be taking you up on transporting me to the church!

This truly has been an interesting journey for me from the onset of the symptoms a few years ago through the surgery and the healing process. But, I do thank God for leading me on every step of my journey! Now, pray that as I return to more office hours and being away from the house that Tigger understands I am not abandoning her. She has definitely enjoyed having me around the house every day! (Shades of the retirement years to come.)



USELESS GROUNDHOG DAY TRIVIA

Since 1887, the groundhog has seen his shadow 103 times, to forecast a longer winter, and not seen it 18 times, to predict an early spring. (There is no record of the prediction for 10 times in the late 19th century.) According to Stormfax Weather Almanac records, Punxsutawney Phil is correct 39% of the time.

Although the typical lifespan of your average groundhog is between six and eight years, Punxsutawney Phil continues to defy the laws of aging. Legend has it that he's been making regular Groundhog Day appearances since 1887, which puts him somewhere in the neighborhood of 129 years old.

While he's certainly the most recognizable, Punxsutawney Phil isn't the only critter in town who tries his paw at predicting the weather. There are at least a dozen others who get lots of attention on Groundhog Day, including Canada's Wiarton Willie and the late Staten Island Chuck. The great state of Texas is known for a lot of things, but

groundhogs aren't one of them. Instead, they turn to an armadillo known as "Bee Cave Bob" to find out whether spring is on its way or if winter is staying put.

In 2010, animal activist group PETA called for Phil to be replaced with a robotic version over concerns about animal cruelty. Thankfully, he hasn't had to relinquish his post and it's expected he'll continue making his predictions for years to come.


