Greetings to you and peace from God our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ.

Three months now we are in the throes of this pandemic. (I began last month's column with the two month indicator.) Much of our daily routines have eased because York County is in the green phase of re-opening. BUT.... we are still NOT in the clear as far as COVID 19 is concerned. Our area is not seeing a spike, but other areas of our nation are. So, we do still need to be vigilant in incorporating as many precautions as we can to squelch the spread of COVID.

Of course, COVID was not the prevalent headline this past month. With the horrific death of George Floyd on Memorial Day we entered into a whirlwind of events that still has many of our minds spinning! I do agree that the arresting officer was totally wrong in keeping his knee on George Floyd's throat for almost nine minutes. I will admit I have not seen the complete video of the confrontation of the officer with George. I will admit that I am only assuming that at first George may have been resisting arrest....I do not know for certain. But, whether he was resisting arrest or not, at the point of the arrest that I have seen I will say that George was no longer struggling with anyone. He did not seem to be trying to get out of custody. He was saying that he couldn't breathe. And, within seconds of George saying he couldn't breathe, the officer should have removed his knee and the pressure he was applying to George's throat. I think that a number of us would agree with this. Now, the aftermath of the death of George Floyd brings us to a totally different matter.

I can see that anger and disgust for the way that George Floyd died would lead many to protest and voice their desire to see changes in the way that police are trained. I support anyone's right to publicly voice their opinion. But, when the rioting and looting began, my voice of support changed. I know that most of the rioters and looters were not any of those who peacefully protested in the first two days following George's death. As I said, I support anyone's right to protest, but I do not support the burning of buildings. I do not support the smashing of windows and the stealing of merchandise from establishments. And, with the death of Rayshand Brooks in Atlanta, I am angry that the Wendy's franchise was burned simply because it was the site where this confrontation took place. What sense does it make to burn a building? What sense does it make to destroy property? In light of the destruction and looting following George Floyd's death a lot of the businesses that were destroyed were owned by Hispanics, Blacks, Asiansnot just Caucasian people. The reaction of the rioting and looting had nothing to do with racial equality. So many



people who worked very hard to build up their establishment had it stolen away from them in minutes. It just does not make sense to me.....at all. I am not a sociologist so I don't even know where to begin to try to justify the reaction we have seen in response to George Floyd's death. I do feel that all the rioting and now the establishment of C.H.O.P is an over-reaction. I had voiced that I think the over-reaction we have witnessed may have been fueled by the fact that we were under stay-at-home directives for so long that given a reason to join with others in the protests escalated the numbers of people joining the cause. And, additional fuel for the protests is the issue of racial and ethnic equality. We do need to look past the color of skin and the heritage of others and work together as one. We need to affirm we are ALL children of God...RED AND YELLOW, BLACK AND WHITE....We are precious in His sight! Jesus loves the little children of the world! ALL of us!

God Bless us ALL! God protect us all!!!



Guidelines for Returning to Indoor Worship

We are doing a number of things preparing to return to indoor worship on July 5. We will try to follow CDC guidelines for the most part. Below is a list of items we lift up for your consideration as we gather for worship in the Sanctuary.

- 1. If you feel even a little bit under the weather, **consider not attending worship**. Even if you are not COVID 19 positive, we want to minimize spreading anything like flu or other viruses. It is always better to be safe than sorry.
- 2. We will ask all people to have a mask. We will have masks available at the door. We would like for all people to wear a mask during worship, but if you have a medical condition that is affected by the wearing of a mask, feel free to not have it covering your face. We recommend at least keeping mouths covered during the singing of hymns and verbal responses in liturgy.
 - Pastor Lou Ann will wear a mask or shield until she enters the Chancel to begin worship and also when she goes back the aisle during the singing of the Congregational Benediction.
- 3. The wearing of gloves will be at your discretion. We will ask that people handling things to be distributed to wear gloves while doing their task.
- 4. The doors will be kept open so that we will not have individuals touching the handles as you enter the church or the Sanctuary.
- 5. We will have a greeter wearing gloves who will hand a bulletin to you and the newsletter if you would like to have a copy. This way, we will not have everyone touching the surface of the next bulletins.
- 6. WE WILL NOT HAVE USHERS receive the offering. The offering plates will be on a table near the entry doors and we ask that you place the offering in the available plates.
- 7. Anyone who has an announcement to share, we will ask you to come to the stand microphone. Consider wearing a glove if you need to touch the microphone. This way too, you will be socially distanced and we will not have someone holding the microphone for you.
- 8. Seating during worship:
 - We will indicate certain pews "DO NOT USE THIS PEW" in order to maintain social distancing. Persons living in the same household or extended families who choose to may sit together closer than six feet. This is up to your discretion. Otherwise, we do ask that you try to keep six feet from other people. We will also set up chairs in the Gathering Room if we need overflow seating.
- 9. While we are under CDC guidelines, when we have a communion service, the Communion Servers will be wearing gloves and will hand you the bread and the cup.
- 10. We have disposable toilet seat covers placed near all toilets. Please consider using them to minimize possible contamination. Also, we have disinfectant spray in all bathrooms and we ask you to spray handles and other surfaces that may have been touched.

If you have any concerns that you feel we need to address, please contact the church office. We do need to do all that we can to stop the spread of any infectious disease. THANK YOU!



Differences become problems only when we choose to measure ourselves by our difference in an effort to determine who is right and who is wrong.


This experiment illustrates that although God is invisible, we can see his work all around us.
