From the

Pastor's Desk



September 2020

Greetings to you and peace from God our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ.

Six months now we are in the throes of this pandemic. (I began July/Aug's column with the three month indicator.) At the beginning of this year I was hoping that 2020 would be a year of "clear vision" but I never dreamed what would become more clear in the intervening months. We definitely still need to be vigilant in incorporating as many precautions as we can to squelch the spread of COVID19. We had the curve on the down slope but then suddenly spikes were everywhere through the nation. Now most areas' numbers are going down. In our community we have become aware of the quarantine for the Dallastown Marching Band (which I have heard was a negative case). I listen for the York County daily cases on the news and that seems like it hit a high and is decreasing at this time. I do feel that some of the spikes in case numbers are because of increased testing and not because the virus is spreading more rapidly. (I may be looking through rose colored glasses with this statement, but please, do not think badly of me for being on the hopeful side.)

The other item that has become more prevalent to me recently is how we are so quick to place a name or an identification on people who have a different opinion from ours. On all levels of our society if anyone says something that is construed as negative about someone else they are immediately termed a "racist"; a "xenophobe"; a "homophobe"; or whatever other name you can think of. I am concerned about how this is deepening the division that has been a part of our society for many years. I will confer that there are SOME people of EVERY ethnicity that do fulfill the qualifications to be classified as any of the "...phobes" we can mention. But, as I said to a family member recently who is very focused on how racism effects their family, I do not look negatively at anyone's skin color, religious affiliation, spiritual practice, lifestyle, etc., UNTIL they do something negative to me or about me. Then, I develop a mindset that they are a person I would rather not associate with. I am insulted if someone terms me a racist simply because I do not like the personality of one person who is black, Latino, Muslim, Asian or whatever. I react to an individual's personality if I do not agree with them or feel comfortable with their personality, but not because they are black, white, brown, gay, Muslim or whatever. Please, let us get past placing identification tags on everyone. PLEASE, pray that the people of our nation can get beyond our divisions and our disdain for anyone who simply disagrees

with us. Let us make a concerted effort to get to the mindset that "we just have to agree to disagree" and not condemn someone with a differing opinion.

I realize that I have not kept a spiritual focus on the previous paragraph. So I will look at that issue with the mindset of "what would Jesus do?" I think the answer to that would be obvious. I think Jesus would direct us to accept one another as we/they are and celebrate who we/they are....especially the differences between us. I think Jesus would tell us to love one another but not love the bad things we/they do or the opposing opinions we/they may have. I think Jesus would tell us that "Yes. Black Lives Matter" but so do "Blue Lives"; "White Lives"; "Children's lives"; "Doctors and Nurses Lives";ALL lives matter! And, we are ALL equal in the eyes of God. I pray we can see one another through the eyes of God.





Landscaping Update from the Trustees

The job of the Trustees of our church is to maintain the church building and surrounding grounds and to make repairs as needed. After considerable review of existing water runoff issues, we have determined what repairs are needed to correct these ongoing problems. We have signed a contract with All Seasons Resources in Dallastown.

Plans are to replace the above ground system which has been causing erosion and damage to the foundation. We will install a below ground system which will help control the water runoff during icy weather. The work will be completed in Phases.

Phase 1 will deal primarily with the east side and south end of the Christian Education wing. Plans include: replacing the down spouts with upgraded materials, removing the grass between the sidewalk and brick structure, and placing a new underground drainpipe system topped with landscape stone from the entry to the sidewalk at the end of the wing. Plants will be added to make a welcoming entrance to the building. With this, the damage that has been done to the cement sidewalks from the mowers will be greatly reduced.

At the stair end of the Christian Education wing where the sidewalk has been damaged, it will be removed and replaced. The grassy areas on both sides of the steps will be removed and landscape stone will be placed between the sidewalk and the building. Plants will also be added at intervals. Phase 2 of the project will be at the main entrance of the church where the sidewalk has begun to sink and is creating pools of water which are undermining the foundation there. The cement area will be raised and stone placed beneath. We will then add landscape stone and drainage pipe to divert the downspout water.

We have encountered the same damage on the west side of the Christian Education wing (outside the main entrance and office area.) The existing down spouts will be connected to a new underground drainage system. This will decrease the chances of ice forming on the drive entrance due to runoff waters during rain or melting snow. The drainpipe will be connected to a stone drain field located at the edge of the driveway area on the west side of the cemetery steps.

As you can imagine, it will take considerable funds to make these repairs and upgrades. Therefore, we are asking for your help to make this possible. One way is through a "*Donors Plaque*". If you would like to make a donation to this project "in memory of" or "in honor of" someone or something, please submit the form below, along with your contribution. *We ask for a minimum of \$50.00 contribution.* The size of the name plate will be approximately 1½ inch x 4 inches. If you wish to remain anonymous, you can request that your name not be placed on the plaque.


