How many times have we passed each other in our daily lives, murmured a quick, "How are you?" and then continued on, choosing not to pause to hear the response? So busy getting from one moment to the next that sometimes we can miss the one we're in. ...

The very definition of connection is the energy exchanged between people paying attention to each other. Energy given, energy gotten. No wonder deeply connecting makes us feel so good. It is one of our most fundamental human needs, yet this desire to bond, to relate, got buried and neglected as our world started spinning faster and our attention was stretched too thin.

Then the whole world finally did stop, but we were told we couldn't be there for each other—at least not in the physical sense. And, oh, how we kicked, screamed, and cried. They said to keep walking, stay away, and maintain our distance, but we craved the thing we could no longer have, so we showed up for each other in entirely new ways.

We asked more of our apps and technology, gathering on video screens and group text chains to check in and catch up. We learned you don't have to shake a hand to show how glad you are to see someone. You don't have to be near to touch someone's soul. Sometimes it's just a smile that gets us by. Seeing that joy in another person's eye or hearing it in their voice. One kind word might save a life.

And we remembered the power of asking, "How are you?" Because the answer mattered. And it matters now: How you are. How I am. How we all are. What else are we doing here on this planet if not to find that out?

We are all going through something, even when it's not the same thing. We all have news, fears, passion, gratitude—sharing is what makes our moments and life markers bearable and real. If the answer to "How are you?" is that you are doing OK despite your circumstances, then there is hope that I can also make it through whatever is on my plate. #### THE PROMISE A TRULY AMAZING LOVE STORY

One evening I found myself at a conference in Washington D.C. And as fate would have it, Bucky Fuller happened to be making a presentation that evening at another conference in the same hotel. I got to the ballroom in time to hear the end of Bucky's lecture. I was in awe of this man in his 80's, with his clear mind, deep wisdom and boundless energy. At the end of the talk we walked together to his airport limousine.

"I've got to go to New York City tonight for another presentation," he said, looking at me with an anxiousness I had rarely seen in Bucky. "You know Annie's not doing well. I'm very concerned about her."

Bucky Fuller had once confided in me that he had promised his wife Annie to die before she did, so that he could be there to welcome her when it was her turn. I took the comment as a hope, not a commitment. Which shows how greatly I underestimated Buckminster Fuller.

Shortly after Bucky's presentation in New York, he learned that Annie had lapsed into a coma in a hospital in Los Angeles. Doctors felt that there was a good chance she would not regain consciousness. Bucky took the first flight he could get. Upon arriving in Los Angeles, he went immediately to Annie's bedside. Sitting beside her, he closed his eyes. And quietly died.

The power to choose life fully was something that Bucky exemplified. So much so that he had the power to choose death when it was time, peacefully, with arms wide open to the universe that he served. It was simply another courageous step forward.

Hours later, Annie peacefully joined him in death. He had kept a promise. He was waiting for her.




**BLY and MIRE**
